Egalitarian Friday Night Services begin at 8:00 p.m., followed by an Oneg.

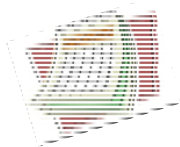
Traditional Saturday morning services begin at 10:00 a.m. and are followed by a Kiddush.

The International March of the Living is an annual educational program that brings individuals from all over the world to Poland and Israel, in order to study the history of the Holocaust and to examine the roots of prejudice, intolerance and hate.

Taking place annually on Yom Hashoah, the March of the Living itself is a 3-kilometer walk from Auschwitz to Birkenau as a silent tribute to all victims of the Holocaust. Another march will take place in Israel on May 2.
