

## Letter from Jerusalem

### Amazing Events:

To stress an optimistic note in these difficult times, the wedding of the daughter of Rabbi Yaakov Litman took place shortly after the shiva time after his death. The Rabbi was a beloved teacher, who was gunned down by a terrorist along with two others. The bride, Sarah Tehiyah and her groom Ariel, decided to hold the wedding in the huge convention hall in central Jerusalem and to invite 'the public.'

Thousands upon thousands took them up on their invitation and sang Am Yisrael Chai and Od Yeshama and Chanukah songs as they waited to enter the main hall. A video was set up to see the chuppah ceremony as tables were set up buffet style to host the guests. The music was festive and the bride danced with as many groups of women as possible. The Ashkenazi chief Rabbi David Lau and the Jerusalem chief Rabbi Shlomo Amar, and Sara Netanyahu, the prime minister's wife were among the throngs who came to celebrate the joyous occasion.

Of course, fresh from mourning the death of his bride's father and her younger brother, Netanel, also killed in the terrorist attack, the groom cried while stamping on the glass under the bridal canopy.

### Doing a Mitzvah:

On the first night of Chanukah I was honored by the visit of a young couple who came to assist me with lighting the chanukiah. In an effort to memorialize a professor who had recently died, these two fourth year medical students at Hadassah hospital had decided to do this mitzvah for elderly people who live alone.

I looked forward to meeting them, and was pleasantly surprised that they came bearing gifts: the ubiquitous sufganiot (by the way, Israelis rarely seem to include latkes in the Chanukah rituals.) chocolate Chanukah gelt, candles and a simple chanukiah.

What was a little startling was the man's appearance. He was wearing jeans, no yarmalkah, sporting an afro hairdo and looking somewhat out of place in this neighborhood. Whereas I always had a supply of yarmalkahs in Indiana, nary a one could be found. Since it is inappropriate to say brochot (blessings), bareheaded, we borrowed a handsome skullcap from a neighbor.

Although my visitor was fluent in Hebrew, apparently, he hadn't had experience in lighting the Chanukah candles. Fortunately I had the written text and was able to guide him in singing all the verses to Maoz Tzur. When I thanked my guests they thanked me for giving them the chance to participate in the ritual. Quite charming medical students, I thought, the wife planning to specialize in gynecology, the husband, in orthopedics.

### Israeli Drug Helped Carter Beat Cancer:

A headline in the Jerusalem Post reported that a drug that was researched and tested here helped former president, Jimmy Carter, overcome his life threatening case of melanoma. Carter announced that the four cancerous lesions on his brain were gone and doctors had found no new signs of cancer growth. He also said he would continue taking Keytruda, one of a new group of immunotherapy drugs. The drug was researched by Jacob Schachter at Sheba Medical Center, Tel Hashomer Hospital. Carter, 91, said he has experienced no side effect to Keytruda.
