The Jewish Scientist who Discovered the Magic of THC

"In the early 1960's, a Bulgarian-born scientist named Raphael Mechoulam was caught carrying 5 kilograms of, as he called it, "superb, smuggled Lebanese hashish" on a bus from Tel Aviv to Rehovot. But, he wasn't planning on smoking the stuff – or even making potzah brei.

"Mecholaum was a young researcher beginning to explore the science behind cannabis, a plant whose medical properties were not yet known.

"Mecholaum, now 86, is still a researcher at Hebrew University in Jerusalem, and credited with isolating THC – the main psychoactive component of marijuana. This has gone on to become the keystone of medical marijuana, which is used for a variety of ailments, from nausea to nerve system pain."

Yiddish in Sweden?

In June 1999, the Swedish Parliament enacted legislation giving Yiddish "legal status" as one of Sweden's official minority languages. In 2006 the Swedish National Language Council was created to "collect, preserve, scientifically research and spread material about the national minority languages." Those languages are named explicitly, including Yiddish.

The Swedish government publishes documents in Yiddish, of which the most recent details the national action plan for human rights.

On April 20, 2006, President George W. Bush proclaimed that May would be Jewish American heritage month. Since then, JAHM programs have taken place across the country. In Washington, D.C. alone, the Library of Congress, National Archives and Records Administration, the National Endowment for the Humanities, the National Gallery of Art, the National Park Service, the Smithsonian Institution and the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum have joined in an effort to raise national consciousness about the contributions of Jewish Americans to our country's heritage.
