Letter from Jerusalem

Some Very Sad Happenings Here:

As the media have publicized, throughout the land there has been a rash of random stabbings of individuals, by terrorists. This is especially troubling because now is the time that Yeshiva and Seminary students whose study year begins now have been arriving from abroad. I don't know the percentage of tourists who may have delayed their trips. The yeshivas, etc. have ordered their students not to leave the campus and the elementary schools have cancelled group visits to historic and holy spots. Although there are shoppers in the center of Jerusalem, the numbers are lower than usual and the storekeepers are hurting for business. Many groups here and abroad are saying "t'hillim" - psalms praying for these terrorist attacks to abate.

"Rachmanut" (compassion):

Recently, Daveed was the target of a thief who attempted to steal his phone. An on-looker, a stranger to Daveed, stepped in and risked his own safety to protect Daveed and thwart the theft. According to Daveed, this heroic act of a stranger "...showed the true character of belonging to one nation who care for one another. One of the reasons I am seriously considering making Aliyah, with HaShem's help, soon is because of people like him. Although he himself was not threatened, he treated me as though I was one of his brothers. I love Israel and I think we should all be like the Israeli man who treats the Jewish nation as though they were his brothers and sisters."

Recently, I was privileged to host, with my co-chair, Yehudit Epstein, the biannual Hoosier-Israeli reunion. Pictures will be available in the next issue of the Jewish Post and Opinion. Quite a variety of Indiana memories were shared by the participants. There was outstanding camaraderie, with some occasional hearty laughter. At least five rabbis were present including Ben Zion Cohen, whose sister is the editor of the P&O, Zvi Leshem, son of Sylvia and Mike Blain, Ronald Gra formerly of B'nai Torah and founder of the Indianapolis Day School and my two sons, Hillel and Rashi. The most senior attendee was Harry Goldstein who was born and lived in Indy until he made Aliyah eight years ago. Harry enlightened us about some early history which included various "shtiblach" (small Shuls) which existed many years ago.

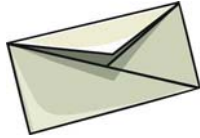
A Personal Occasion:

The Indiana Jewish Historical Society

The Indiana Jewish Historical Society was founded in 1972 to collect, preserve and publish material involving 200 years of Jewish life in Indiana. The organization aims to gather and preserve the records of synagogues, temples and societies, Jewish life cycle events, personal memorabilia, scrapbooks and diaries, burial and cemetery records, government documents such as naturalization records, news articles and photographs.

Another goal of the Indiana Jewish Historical Society is to provide data not always available to historians, scholars and authors, thus helping to provide an awareness of the role played by Jews and Jewish communities in the creation of the religious climate of Indiana.

IJHS founders ensured that the Jewish experience in Indiana would be preserved and conveyed with the creation of an annual publication, *Indiana Jewish History*. Past articles have told the stories of settlers in Richmond and Terre Haute in 1818, the beginning of the Fort Wayne congregation in 1848 and the dedication of the Madison synagogue in 1855. There are accounts of stores founded more than 100 years ago in Plymouth, Wabash, and Huntington, and the role of the Lafayette congregation in the Reform movement in the late 19th century and the history of self help organizations in the community, beginning in 1907.

Jews have been living in and influencing life in what is now Indiana for nearly two centuries. Our history here is both long and rich. To learn more, go to the IJHS web site at www.ijhs.org. You will likely enjoy this visit to our past.
